- To address the students by the Principal & HODs at the beginning of the session airing discipline, moral ethics & values for maintaining serene atmosphere of the college.
- To improve teaching-learning process, ICT should be utilized maximally .
- To conduct remedial classes, group discussions and classroom seminars to increase class room interaction among teachers & students.
- To advice the students for using the library and internet for recent updating and advancement of knowledge.
- To make the campus eco-friendly.
- To conduct inter-departmental seminars for better academic understanding among the students and teachers.

7.2 Provide the Action Taken Report (ATR) based on the plan of action decided upon at the beginning of the year

The instructions given in 7.1 have been followed and no adverse incident and negative remarks have been reported so far.

7.3 Give two Best Practices of the institution (*please see the format in the NAAC Self-study Manuals*)

1. Improvement in performance of the students in University Examinations.
  - Detail analyses show that over all performances of the students in University examination are moderately satisfactory. However, more improvement is required so that much more students should get their positions in top twenties by scoring more marks.
  - To achieve much better results, more remedial classes, group discussions and classroom seminars should be organized in addition to the normal classes scheduled in the routine. Latest information should be given using ICT and advising the students for becoming more acquainted with internet and related websites. Students should be engaged to use the library and avail themselves of the facility more frequently.
  - Students are, in general, exposed to latest developments in the respective subjects/fields through their participation in Seminars held at the college from time to time in different departments.
  - Evidence of success could be realized from the performances of the students.
  - Still, achievement is not up to the level of expectation because of less number of teachers and high student-teacher ratio.
2. Practice of social harmony for increasing unity, social responsibility and universal brother and sister hood.
  - At the beginning of the session, Principal and HODs address the students to throw light on the chronological developments of the college and achievements of the college in the fields of academic performances, sports and culture.
  - Moral, ethical and social responsibilities are being discussed to reduce mental tension, bad habits, and unruly as well as unpleasant behaviour and to make them friendly to each other.
  - Importance of secularism and fundamentals of the constitution are also narrated to maintain social harmony and unity among the people of the society.
  - Parent-Teachers meeting are called on by the Principal/Professor-in-charge from time to time to discuss the academic progress of the students, their behaviour inside the campus and social attitudes of the students. Parents are advised to take care of their wards for maintaining social attitudes outside the college campus, regularity in study and engagement in sports & culture also.

- Environmental pollution should be reduced for healthy and eco-friendly campus.




## 8. Plans of institution for next year

1. Renovation only can not satisfy the need of the college hence, upgraded infrastructure facilities would be provided at the earliest for the betterment of academic as well as administrative activities.
2. International conference/Seminar should be organized . Faculty should take part at least 3-4 conference/Seminar per year and budgetary provisions should be allowed for this purpose.
3. Vacant faculty positions should be filled up so as to provide more remedial classes/interactive sessions for better performance of the students in university and other different competitive examinations. Required no. of Guest Teachers should be appointed with the permission of the University.
4. Vacant posts of non-teaching staff (Class III & IV) must be filled up for smooth functioning of administrative works.
5. Placement cell and NSS unit should be made more effective.
6. Quality medical service should be provided to staff and students as far as practicable.
7. The campus should be made more eco-friendly and more ICT facilities should be available in the college campus.
8. E-library and transport facilities are urgently required.
9. Hard copies of journals as well as e-journal facilities should be provided if financial assistance and other suitable facilities are available.
10. Science laboratories should be upgraded and more equipped to maintain balance with the UGC syllabus (all India level) in regard to the experiments.
11. All classes are planned to be conducted using Smart Boards and Power Point presentation.
